



**FIELDS ANNOUNCED FOR THE
USTA/ITA NATIONAL INDOOR INTERCOLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS
AT THE USTA BILLIE JEAN KING NATIONAL TENNIS CENTER NOVEMBER 3-6**

**2010 US Open Standout Beatrice Capra, 2010 NCAA Champion Chelsey Gullickson
and 2011 ITA All-American Champion Mitchell Frank Highlight Fields**

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y., October 28, 2011 – The USTA and Intercollegiate Tennis Association announced today the fields for the 2011 USTA/ITA National Indoor Intercollegiate Championships, which will take place at the USTA Billie Jean King National Tennis Center’s Indoor Building November 3-6. The men’s field will feature reigning ITA All-American champion **Mitchell Frank** and the ITA’s top-ranked player **Alex Domijan**, both of the University of Virginia, while the women’s field includes 2010 NCAA Champion **Chelsey Gullickson** of the University of Georgia and **Beatrice Capra** of Duke University, who reached the third round at the 2010 US Open.

The USTA/ITA National Indoor Intercollegiate Championships features a 32-player singles field and 20-team doubles field for men and women, including: champions from the 24 Division I USTA/ITA Regional Championships, the USTA/ITA National Small College champion, the eight quarterfinalists of the ITA Men’s All-American Championships and ITA/Riviera All-American Championships for women, and at-large and wild card selections made by the ITA and USTA. Additionally, Columbia University, which is serving as the host school for the second consecutive year, will receive a wild card entry into each draw. In total, 126 players from 54 schools will compete in New York in singles or doubles.

“We are excited to once again partner with the ITA in hosting this event that features some of the country’s top collegiate tennis players,” said Patrick McEnroe, General Manager, USTA Player Development. “That the event is held at the home of the US Open provides a unique opportunity for these players to compete on a world-class stage.”

Other players in the men’s field include: 2009 USTA Boys’ 18s National Champion **Chase Buchanan** of the Ohio State University; 2008 USTA Boys’ 18s National Clay Court Champion **Evan King** of the University of Michigan; and 2008 USTA Boys’ 18s National runner-up **Ryan Thacher** of Stanford University.

In addition to Gullickson and Capra, other participants in the women’s field include: reigning NCAA Champion **Jana Juricova** of the University of Cal-Berkeley; two-time USTA Girls’ 18s National runner-up **Nicole Gibbs** of Stanford University; and **Lauren Embree** of the University of Florida, who won the clinching match for the Gators at the 2011 NCAA Championships.

The field will also feature a number of players from the New York Tri-State area, including **Lauren McHale** of North Carolina, who hails from Englewood Cliffs, N.J., and is the older sister of the WTA’s No. 2-ranked American Christina McHale; **Robin Anderson** of UCLA, who hails from Matawan, N.J., and reached the girls’ quarterfinals at the 2010 US Open; **Emily Fraser** of Virginia, who hails from Rye, N.Y.; and **Haig Schneiderman** of Columbia, who hails from New York City.

Past champions and finalists include **James Blake** (Harvard), **Bob and Mike Bryan** (Stanford), **John Isner** (Georgia), **Lisa Raymond** (Florida), **Laura Granville** (Stanford), **Michael Russell** (Miami), **Paul Annacone** (Tennessee), **Brad Gilbert** (Pepperdine), **Todd Martin** (Northwestern) and **MaliVai Washington** (Michigan).
